Camperships (scholarships)

Any registered Scout in the Potawatomi Area Council who is unable to afford the full camp fee may apply for a campership to cover part of the fees (Normally, families are expected to try to cover part of the expenses by participating in unit fundraisers). Campership funds may be limited and they will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis. <u>Campership applications</u> are due by May 10.

Camp Long Lake Code of Conduct

Scouts, Adults, and Staff are encouraged to refer to the Scout Law with reference to their attitude and behavior when at Camp Long Lake. Additionally:

- All forms of bullying (aggressive/passive) and harassment including verbal, physical, and cyberbullying are prohibited for all Scouts, Leaders, Adults, or Staff members.
- Physical contact between individuals is not allowed.
- Foul Language will not be allowed as each person should be respectful and honest in all verbal exchanges and comments.
- Actions and behaviors between others will be respectful.

Appropriate attire is required for all activities:

- General Attire
 - Modest clothing comparable to style and lengths of Scout Activity (Class B) uniform is required
 - Field uniform (Class A) will be worn respectfully for all requested and appropriate events and programs
 - o <u>Activity uniform (Class B)</u> or Troop T-shirts are appropriate at camp when not wearing the Field uniform (Class A).
 - o Activity uniforms (Class B) are typically non-v-neck t-shirts with official BSA shorts
- Swim Attire
 - A Scout's safety should be considered over everything else protecting people's health and maintaining dignity and respect is first and foremost
 - Designed as swimwear (not street clothes)
 - Secure enough to not shift or fall off while participating in activities and cover private parts
 - Should be appropriate for heavy physical activity such
- Footwear
 - Be appropriate for the type of physical activity
 - Maybe required depending on the activity
 - o Should not limit or hamper movement in the water

Acceptability of the above is under the purvey of the unit leader and charter organization. If necessary, behavior or clothing options can be discussed with the camp director. If any of the above codes are violated, the participant may be asked to leave camp immediately.

Medical Forms

All Scouts and leaders in camp for more than 72 hours must have a completed medical form (Parts A, B, and C) signed by a medical examiner and parent (for youth) and a **front and back** copy of their health insurance coverage card. The medical form needs a medical examiner's signature dated within the last 12 calendar months, along with a new medication card. The signature is valid until the end of the month a year after it is dated (ie. the examiner's signature dated 7/1/2021 is valid through 7/31/2022). Anyone staying less than 72 hours needs AT LEAST parts A and B (B1 and B2) filled out completely as well as both sides of the insurance card must be included. Camping - Site

We are camping in the same campsite as last year, Bear Trail. We will be using the tents provided by the camp on camp platforms. These are two person tents with cots and mattresses for each person. We will also have use of the troop teepee for scouts to sleep in during the week. Hopefully, all of you have retained the mosquito netting and supports that we have used in the past. The troop also has a supply of netting for your use during the week. For those needing to make a set, we can supply you with a set of plans.

Camp Long Lake Daily Camp Schedule

Merit Badge Sessions: Badge sessions are generally 45 minutes long and start on the hour allowing 15 minutes to get to your next activity. Some are scheduled for a double period of 1 hour 45 minutes. All badges are limited to 25 participants unless noted.

Noonwatch: This is an all faith, inspirational service to help Scouts fulfill their Duty to God. Noonwatch is held after lunch at 1:15 PM. Half the week units will be able to attend in person (Monday and Friday) and the other half will be done on their own site with pre-planned service (Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday).

It is a great opportunity to schedule a time to make up requirements with a merit badge counselor or go have fun in program area competitions/events being held around camp. X-TREME Outpost Program

Outpost is a perfect opportunity for those Scouts who have done a lot already at Camp Long Lake over the years and are looking for something new to do. Our outpost trek program is scheduled as half-day adventures with activities that are both on and off the camp property. Scouts who choose to participate will be busy with the program from lunch to dinner and some nights. We will provide trail lunches for the days they are out of camp. To register you must:

- Be at least 13 years of age. Adults are able to attend, too (if able to drive, a discount will be offered).
- Scouts sign up for the entire week, or individual events.
- There is an additional charge per person to participate. The cost for all events, a week-long participant, is \$95 per person (discounted price), or individual prices for events are listed below. Payments need to be made in the Trading Post or PRIOR to camp.
- Any merit badges/awards missed while on Outpost events can be made up with the Scout's
 counselor. Scouts need to schedule time with their counselor. Our staff is understanding of this and
 willing to work with all Scouts.

Polaris-BSA ATV Pilot Program - Combined with Outpost

OPEN ATV: Scouts will have the opportunity to participate in Open ATV at various times throughout the week. To Participate Scouts must have proper attire (Longsleeve shirts, Pants, Closed-Toed Shoes (preferably boots)) Gloves, Helmets and Goggles will be provided.

Individual Cost: \$15/1 hour slot (Purchase the OPEN ATV ticket from the Trading Post)

Space Limitation: 6 participants (limited by only having 6 ATVs)

Scouts must have completed the WI DNR ATV certification to participate. Spots Fill Up Quickly.

Time: Monday 10:00 AM - 11:00 AM, Wednesday 10:00 AM - 11:00 AM

Scouts must be at least 14 years old to participate. We are not allowed any flexibility in this age requirement per BSA.

Adult Leaders

Adult leaders are always welcomed at camp for a day or two or the entire week. If adults are going to attend for longer than 72 hours, they need to be a registered leader. We are required to have in camp a minimum of two leaders at all times. Please let me know if you wish to help out as a leader for our week at camp. It is possible for adults to share parts of the week and yet still maintain our minimum of 2 adults in camp for the week. Leader fees are \$140.00 for the entire week or \$35.00/day. If we have adults sharing a week (1 Mon-Wed. & 1 Wed-Sat) that would count as 1 adult all week.

Any scout considering working at camp must be 15 years old. They do have a counselor in training (CIT) program for those wanting to get a taste of what it is like to work on staff, Minimum age to be a CIT is 14 years old. There is no charge to be a CIT. Please see me if your son is interested in this.

I will be sending a final letter out the closer we get to camp that has all of the last minute details for our week at camp. If you or your son has any questions, please call me at 262 689 9157, or see me at any troop meeting and I will do my best to answer them for you.
